LOVING ONE ANOTHER

Jesus said that a distinguishing mark of Christians would be the love they show toward each other. "By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another" (John 13:35). How do we measure up to this standard?



In biblical terms, love is not primarily an emotion but a behavior. The focus is not on feelings but on action. Jesus taught us, "Love your enemies" (Matthew 5:44). This command does not require us to manufacture fond or romantic feelings toward those who mistreat us, but it teaches us to treat them kindly and compassionately, showing love in the face of persecution and opposition. Thus, Jesus went on to explain in the same verse, "Bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them which despitefully use you, and persecute you."

James similarly explained that true Christian character is revealed not by what we profess but what we do: "If a brother or sister be naked, and destitute of daily food, and one of you say unto them, Depart in peace, be ye warmed and filled; notwithstanding ye give them not those things which are needful to the body; what doth it profit?" (James 2:15-16).

John also emphasized that we must express love by action. "Hereby perceive we the love of God, because he laid down his life for us: and we ought to lay down our lives for the brethren. But whoso hath this world's good, and seeth his brother haveneed, and shutteth up his bowels of compassion from him, how dwelleth the love of God in him? My little children, let us not love in word, neither in tongue; but in deed and in truth" (I John 3:16-18).

In fact, if we claim to love God but do not show love to people, then we only deceive ourselves. "If a man say, I love God, and hateth his brother, he is a liar: for he that loveth not his brother whom he hath seen, how can he love God whom he hath not seen? And this commandment have we from him, That he who loveth God love his brother also" (I John 4:20-21).

As this passage indicates, love should begin within the church. Paul instructed, "As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith" (Galatians 6:10). If we cannot act lovingly toward our fellow believers, then we certainly won't act lovingly toward unbelievers and opponents of truth.

Therefore, each of us needs to ask: Am I showing love toward others, especially fellow believers? Or more specifically: What am I doing to demonstrate and impart God's love to other people, especially those in the church?

Answering this question certainly includes avoiding any actions that could harm others. Thus we must not sow discord, cause strife, become tale bearers, or put a stumbling block in people's lives. But answering this question also involves positive actions such as intercessory prayer, encouragement, courtesy, kindness, mercy, and practical forms of assistance in times of need.

One of the keys to revival and growth is for us to help one another and love one another. In doing so, we will show the world that we are truly Christians.

TRUE WORSHIP

Psalm 150:1-6 KJV "Praise ye the LORD. Praise God in his sanctuary: praise him in the firmament of his power. [2] Praise him for his mighty acts: praise him according to his excellent greatness. [3] Praise him with the sound of the trumpet: praise him with the psaltery and harp. [4] Praise him with the timbrel and dance: praise him with stringed instruments and organs. [5] Praise him upon the loud cymbals: praise him upon the high sounding cymbals. [6] Let every thing that hath breath praise the LORD. Praise ye the LORD."



An overflow of worship

As an Apostolic Pentecostal, I find that my church experience diverges significantly from that of other denominations. As I share with many of my christians family and friends, explaining to them how we worshipped, particularly those adhering to Orthodox and Catholic traditions, their reactions often border on disbelief and astonishment. The loud expressions of praise-clapping of hands, joyful leaps, and even sprinting down the aisles, would seem very strange and unknown to them. Presenting them with a glimpse of our Sunday night evangelistic gatherings through videos often leaves their mouth wide open, never would they expect a church service to be that way. Our manner of worship closely mirrors the reverence and devotion demonstrated by David in his worship of the Lord as depicted in the Bible.

The word "praise" originates from the Old French word "preisier," which means "to praise, value, or prize." It originates from the Latin word "pretiare" which means "to prize, value, or esteem." According to Saint Augustine, it is evident that various human faculties are engaged in the creation of music through these instruments: "The breath is employed in blowing the trumpet; the fingers are used in striking the strings of the psaltery and the harp; the whole hand is exerted pin beating the timbrel; the feet move in the dance"

For David, worship wasn't just a practice, it wasn't a religious duty or a task to complete – it was a second instinct to his being; it defined his lifestyle and identity. Worship came to David in times of mourning and victory.



1 Samuel 30:1-6 ESV

Now when David and his men came to Ziklag on the third day, the Amalekites had made a raid against the Negeb and against Ziklag. They had overcome Ziklag and burned it with fire [2] and taken captive the women and all who were in it, both small and great. They killed no one, but carried them off and went their way. [3] And when David and his men came to the city, they found it burned with fire, and their wives and sons and daughters taken captive. [4] Then David and the people who were with him raised their voices and wept until they had no more strength to weep. [5] David's two wives also had been taken captive, Ahinoam of Jezreel and Abigail the widow of Nabal of Carmel. [6] And David was greatly distressed, for the people spoke of stoning him, because all the people were bitter in soul, each for his sons and daughters. But David strengthened himself in the LORD his God.

Despite facing attacks from his enemies and the anger of his own men who sought to stone him, David found peace and inner strength in his unwavering trust in the Lord, his God.

One of my mentors and pastors, Pastor Benjie, once taught that worship is the true essence of our faith to God. Our worship is important to demonstrate our faith to God. In my personal experiences, when I'm in His presence during worship, it lifts the weight of burdens and struggles, offering comfort during trials and tribulations, and infusing joy into moments of sadness.

Interestingly enough, the meanings of the names Ahinoam and Abigail in Hebrew are joy and grace. The devil will target the "joy" in your life and the "grace" in your life. Just like David and the Amalekites, the enemy might try to target the joy and grace in your life, but it has no authority to destroy it. The Amalekites were a brutal and vile nation; despite that, they were not able to destroy or kill the women and children of David and his men.

Yet during his trials and sorrows, he never stopped worshipping God.

THE TESTAMENT OF OUR FAITH

A pastor once said, "Worship is a testament of our faith to God." The quote is very true; true worship can demonstrate our faith to God, but have we replaced our faith with solely worship? Do we treat our worship as more important than having faith in God? Faith in worship is essential; without faith, our worship is just noise. We can jump, run, and roll on the ground, but if our faith is nowhere to be seen, it is all for nothing. Worship can shake a mountain, but it is our faith in God that can move it.

A man who understood the truth of worship and faith is David. David went through many trials and tribulations; he faced wild animals, giants, and kings. His parents neglected him, his brothers were jealous of him, and his mentor and king despised him. Yet David worshipped God; he worshipped God with all his might and without fear of being criticized for his worship.
